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History Center Hosts 39 from the Classroom on Wheels Program

On December 7 and 8, 2022. the History Center played host to 39 students from the Classroom on Wheels program. Classroom on Wheels is a lifelong learning program offered through the Adult and Community Enrichment Division of Suncoast Technical College. The students take half-day field trips all over Manatee and Sarasota counties to study topics in business and industry,

arts and culture, history, religion, education, social services, agriculture, and more.

On this particular field trip, the students were treated to a backstage tour of the History Center's extensive collections led by History Center Manager Dr. Josh Goodman, as well as a local history primer offered by History Center Friends President Dr. Frank Cassell.

Part One of the History Center's "Big Move" is On Schedule

Thanks to the recent renewal of Sarasota County's one-cent surtax, funding is now available for a new 30,000-square-foot History Center building adjacent to the Fruitville Public Library at 100 Apex Road, just east of Interstate 75.

The new center won't open until 2026 or so, but the moving process is already underway. The History Center's current location at 6062 Porter Way has been identified as the site for a new fire department administration building, so the History Center will soon move into temporary quarters at the old Osprey Schoolhouse on Tamiami Trail.

This beautiful 1927 building was previously the visitor center for Historic Spanish Point, and it is currently the home of the Osprey Public Library. The most frequently used materials from the History Center's collection will reside with the staff at the new temporary Osprey location, while the rest of the collection will be stored in secure, climate-controlled county buildings elsewhere.

Public access to the full collection will continue even during this phase. Staff will make regular trips to the temporary storage facilities to retrieve materials requested by the public for research purposes. The History Center aims to open its doors at its new temporary location in Osprey on May 1, 2023.

One big advantage of being at Osprey is that the History Center will now have access to a large public meeting room for hosting lectures, workshops, pop-up exhibits, and other programs. Sarasota County's Historical Commission and Historic Preservation Board will also begin meeting at the Osprey location. Stay tuned for more details on this exciting new development.

New Exhibit: The Man with the Little Black Bag

What was it like to visit the doctor 100 years ago? Well, for starters, it was quite common for the doctor to come to *you* rather than the other way around. The History Center's newest exhibit highlights the careers of two Sarasota doctors, Furman Chairs Whitaker and his son Harper Elliott Whitaker. Together, their careers spanned more than half a century, a period that saw monumental changes in the practice of medicine.

The Man with the Little Black Bag features books, medical equipment, and photographs from the Whitaker Family Collection at the Sarasota County History Center. It is located in the ground floor showcase at the Sarasota County Administration Center at 1660 Ringling Boulevard in Sarasota, right across the hall from the County Commission Chambers. The building and the exhibit are open to the public. The exhibit will remain on display until late March.

Collection Highlight: Englewood Volunteer Fire Department Scrapbook

Englewood Early had professional fire department to relv on in case emergency—only the help of quick-thinking citizens. That all changed in 1949 when a group of locals established a volunteer fire department, which managed fire and rescue services for the Englewood area until 1983 when the Englewood Area Fire Control District was established.

This scrapbook, donated by a former fire chief, Ronald F. Andrick, contains newspaper clippings and photographs documenting the Englewood Volunteer Fire Department and its work in the community. It is open for public research as Collection MSS 285.

Artifact Highlight: A Washboard Made of... Glass?

You've heard of a washboard, but what about a washboard made of *glass*? That's right... glass. This washboard, manufactured by the Carolina Washboard Company in Raleigh, North Carolina, features a glass surface on which to scrub clothing, and would have been a handy household implement back in the days before washing machines.

A glass washboard would have been more costly than the usual metal kind, but the advantage was that the surface would not corrode as easily and cause either damage or discoloration to clothing during use. This particular washboard is part of a larger collection of antique household items donated to the History Center by Pine Shores Presbyterian Church in 2017.

Volunteer Highlights

Reference Collection Indexing: Volunteer Virginia B. has been working hard on indexing the History Center's extensive Reference Collection (sometimes called the "Vertical File"). The Reference Collection consists of about 15,000 folders of information on all kinds of topics in local and regional history, all arranged alphabetically. To date Virginia has indexed more than 6,400 folders in the collection. Once the index is complete it will be available online, making it much easier to request folders ahead of your next research visit.

Map Indexing: Volunteer Mike G. has been updating the History Center's catalog of historical maps, which contains thousands of topographical maps, survey and sales plats for subdivisions, topographical maps, Sanborn fire insurance maps, aerial photographs, and much more.

Snake Island Ceramic Artifacts: Volunteer Michelle C. has been working closely with County Archaeologist Steve Koski to create a detailed catalog of ceramic artifacts recovered from Snake Island near the entrance to Robert Bay. Through careful analysis, Michelle and Steve have even identified sherds from the same clay vessels that fit together!
